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Breadbox Offering: Free Clothes and More

In September, Free Clothes and More celebrated it's 2nd anniversary of service to the community by giving toiletries, paper products, cleaning agents and clothing for free for those who come once a month to receive them. During this time, we've served from a few families to 87 families each time we're open and have developed a bit of a relationship with some of the clients who come regularly. Most are very grateful for what they receive, and we are blessed in return. Thus far, we've not received money from grants, but have been blessed by the gracious giving of our own people, some from another church, from two businesses who've had fund-raisers for us, and from several people in the community who've been supportive of the effort. This outreach is pretty much the only game in town. Many depend on it and have been missing this generous program during the pandemic. Your committee is looking for ways to get clothing out to people in a safe and practical way. Free Clothes and More was re-instituted in August after a 4 and ½ month hiatus. God has richly provided our needs through these two years, meeting the outflow with the income to keep us going. Thank you for your support. We've decided to have the project as the October breadbox and would appreciate your continued prayers and financial generosity as you can.

Demonstrating the love of Jesus is the goal along with meeting people's needs. If you write a check, make it out to the church and annotate it for Free Clothes and More or October breadbox offering. We may reinstitute the little breadbox offering envelopes that were in the pew racks before the pandemic so cash can be included.

Mom's House helps single parent families in our community by providing child care to those enrolled in college, assisting them with completion of their degrees.



Reformation Day 1955

Many Protestant churches celebrate "Reformation Day" on the last Sunday of October to commemorate Martin Luther posting his 95 theses on October 31, 1517. This act that would lead to the Protestant Reformation.

Though Lutheran churches had been celebrating the day for years, one of the first local interdenominational services was held at Conklin Ave Baptist Church, Binghamton on October 30, 1955 at 7:30 PM. The event was sponsored by the United Churches of Broome County. Other participating churches included Trinity Episcopal Church. The guest speaker was Colgate Rochester Divinity School Professor Justin Wroe Nixon.


Whether or not Main Street Baptist took part is unknown. The Binghamton Press articles and our church ad did not mention it. In fact, the scheduled morning sermon was "Sermon in Shoes" James 1:6 "This thing called faith". (One might chuckle if they are familiar with the story of Martin Luther wanting to exclude the Epistle of James from the Bible ©). The evening service was a Family Night featuring a play "Family Worship at Murphy's".

Greetings Church Family,

By God's grace we've endured together through the trials of this year to Autumn. As we look forward to the remainder of the year I wanted to prepare you for what portions of the Bible we will be discussing together as a church.

In the evening service it is my intention to explore some of the Psalms. The Psalms are God's songs written for us to sing back to him. They tune our hearts to speak to God rightly. Are you angry or frustrated? There are Psalms that can help you voice that to God constructively. Are you scared or ashamed? There are Psalms to remind you where to place your trust. Are you joyful or thankful? The Holy Spirit has provided us Psalms to help express this as well.

Come out as we explore some of the common themes and tropes, see how the Psalms point us to Christ, and how these inspired words can deepen our prayers to the Triune God who gave them to us.

In our morning service throughout October we will finish up Joel, and then pick up where we left off last Fall in Paul's first letter to the Corinthians. I encourage you to reread the entire letter before we start to refresh yourselves with what we have gone over in previous years together. Lord willing, the tentative sermons schedule for October is as follows:

11: 1 Corinthians 8:1-13

18: 1 Cor 9:1-14

25: 1 Cor 9:15-23

Read ahead and come prepared to worship and hear our Lord from his Scriptures this month.
