I wanted to write a quick note thanking you for your continued prayer and support in my forthcoming missions trip. Though the trip has been postponed, I have not lost the excitement or anticipation for it. God had this planned from the beginning and I trust that he knows what is best for me and my missions team, but also the precious souls in Togo.

Currently, my team is planning on flying out to Togo on the 24th of November...and flying home on the 22nd of December. Due to a slightly shortened trip we will be jumping right away into teaching in the schools (teaching ESL) and ministering to the believers. (Heather will train local teachers on how to teach, do lesson plans, etc., assisting in vacation Bible school events, helping women set up Bible studies and lead them, and assisting in a local shelter for young women and orphans.)

While my hope and prayer is to still go to Togo, there is a possibility that this desire will not come to fruition. Over the past few months, I have started to work toward many a plan B; however, God has unequivocally shut each and every one of those opportunities. It is certainly a blessing to know that God is at work in this internship.... I am confident that His plans surpass any that I could desire. Flexibility and humility are vital in every walk of life and I am glad that God has used this time to show me what it truly means to be flexible and humble.

On Palm Sunday, March 28, 1920, the memorial plaque for Herman J. Britton located in the sanctuary, was unveiled by his mother Mrs. Elizabeth Britton. Herman Britton served with Company H, 107th Infantry during World War I. This unit consisted of men from Broome County. He was killed in action in Bony, France on September 29, 1918 during the drive on the Hindenburg Line. A Binghamton Press article dated September 28, 1933 noted of the 187 men of Co. H, only ten avoided death, wounds or being gassed during the campaign. Fifteen would give their lives.

The tablet was made by the S.J. Kelley Engraving Company. Our former organist Melvin Kelley was an employee there as well as the son of S.J. Kelley. The company also made a similar second tablet for North Presbyterian Church, Binghamton in memory of John Leonard Livingston. Livingston, another Co H member, died from injuries he received on September 29, 1918 in Bony, France.

Did you know?

This year marks the 400th Anniversary of the Mayflower ship arriving in America. One of our former members, Lydia Rosetta [Alden] Tripp was a descendant of Mayflower passengers John & Priscilla Alden. Mrs. Tripp died in March 1982 at the age of 99.
