MISSIONS REPORT by Diane Runion

CHOSEN PEOPLE MINISTRIES

Some have been asking about this ministry of late as to its function and scope. We have included it in our mission budget over the last couple of years and we're happy to share what it does. Part of its function is to witness to Jewish people of the salvation found in their Messiah, Jesus, and to encourage Messianic congregations and new believers in the faith. There are centers here and in Israel and around the world that testify to that fact and also encourage and help those who are persecuted because of their faith. There is a monthly newsletter that gives information about Jewish holy days and festivals and how Jesus has fulfilled each of them, gives news briefs from around the world, and has ways to approach Jewish people with the Gospel.

This last newsletter details the numbers of Jews that are fleeing to Israel from Ukraine. Under Project Promised Land, through Chosen People, there are efforts to provide housing, basic language skills, job counseling, friendship and whatever is needed to help the resettle in that country. There is an expected 50,000 to 100,000 who will flee to Israel over the next year, and the government will give full citizenship to those who can demonstrate they have at least one Jewish grandparent. It is an overwhelmingly massive wave of immigrants. Pray for all the Ukrainian people who are leaving their devastated country and for the efforts of Israel and Chosen People Ministries in this relief of the suffering experienced by them.

CHILDREN OF GOD

In June, we celebrate Fathers' Day and Children's Day. I was looking over some things I had saved, and one of them was from a Tabletalk magazine of July 2013. Let me give some excerpts from that cut-out.

"In Ephesians 5:1, Paul reminds us of sonship. We are 'beloved children'. Father and beloved child is one of the most precious metaphors for our relationship with God. When Jesus teaches us to pray, He says, 'Our Father', not 'our Captain,' not 'our King' or not even 'our Shepherd,' but 'our Father.'

Church History News

The Korean War began on June 25, 1950. One of our former members, Dominick Marcello, was wounded in the Korean War while serving in the US



military. The following is from the June 2002 Main Artery: On May 18, 2002 The Daughters of the American Revolution honored Dominick Marcello and four other combat Korean War Veterans at a luncheon and presentation of a certificate for their contribution toward freedom. Dom served in Korea as an infantryman in the 7th Division. During this time, he earned a

Combat Infantry Badge, the Korean Campaign Badge with a cluster, and the Purple Heart. He recently was informed that he was eligible and would be receiving the Korean War Service Medal from the Republic of South Korea after a period of 50 years. (June 2002 Artery)

Fallout at Main Street Baptist?

Many decades ago, it was common to see black and yellow fallout shelter signs on buildings. It was the Cold War Era and threats of a nuclear war with the Soviet Union and other communist countries was a possibility. Around April or May 1962, the local

Office of Civil Defense sent a letter to Main Street Baptist Church noting the building "has been selected by the Federal Government as a potential community shelter." The church, of course had to agree to it which we did. The June 20, 1962 Trustees minutes noted they agreed to "allow the use of the church as a fallout shelter "in case of emergency". Whether or not we were actually chosen by the Office of Civil Defense is another matter. Growing up I don't recall seeing any signs on the church property designating it as such. However, if anyone has any information it would be most welcome in the history files.
