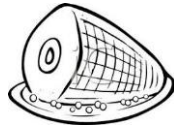

LETTER FROM THE DUNNEMANS (EXCERPTS)

Dear Friends,

We thought you would want to know that Reg and I are well and enjoying our semi-retirement (in between our continuing music ministry programs). By the time you read this letter, we will have sung over seventy times in 2022.

(They report on several visits to relatives and friends after the lifting of COVID concerns)

This summer we were the song leaders at the Odosagih Bible Conference for the twelfth year in a row. The conference's 100th anniversary summer was a wonderful time! At the Bible conference we get to live in our country coach RV which was our traveling home for over 600k miles. Now it is our permanently parked summer home. We released our new collection of songs entitled "How Can I keep From Singing?" Who would have dreamed that Reg and I would have recorded three cassettes and twelve CDs?

Son Tyler and Natalie Daffinee have relocated to Mt. Lebanon, PA just west of Pittsburgh. Mason and Master Sergeant Jennifer Daffinee have thoroughly enjoyed the first year of Jennifer's three-year assignment at the Ramstein Air Force Base in Germany. We hope to visit them in the spring.

Reg and I are singing four or five times each month for monthly seniors meetings in large churches and in smaller churches who invite us for worship concerts. I enjoy weeding community gardens three or four mornings a week here at 11 Villaggio. On Friday afternoons I volunteer at the Loving Hands Ministry Thrift Shop and organize their books. On Thursdays Reg is a docent at the Sarasota Antique Car Museum.

As you read this letter, we will be on our way to Stratford, Ontario for Christmas and New Years with family. May the Lord continue to bless you as you love Him and serve Him. Emmanuel! God is with us!

exploitation, or who ,because of their homelessness and poverty are vulnerable. In these centers and safe homes, victims are helped to heal. There are many efforts to alleviate poverty by providing basic needs of food and clothing, protection, educational training, and adequate medical treatment. Job opportunities and job readiness training helps to build confidence and breaks the cycle of oppression and codependency. It is a long and painful process and churches and Christian organizations partner with Send Relief to be the hands and feet of Jesus. BOOK REVIEW

“The Church Behind the Wire” by Barnabas Mam is a story of faith in the killing fields of Cambodia. “Barnabas Mam's conversion to Christianity (from Buddhism), coincided with the rise of a notoriously deadly regime. One of only 200 Christians to survive Pol Pot's genocidal campaign, the author proceeded to become the foremost evangelist and church planter in Cambodia.”

Because of the content of the story, it is difficult to read, but it shows God's interventions in Barnabas' life and in the life and in the history and future of his country.
It will soon be on the turntable in the entry.

History & Library News

In January, many churches focus in on the plight of human trafficking. Main Street Baptist has had programs in the past, such as “Breaking the Chains” that included insight from various speakers. As noted in Diane’s mission column, the breadbox for January will go to Send Relief . In the library, we have the DVD, *Amy Carmichael: Mother to the Motherless*. Amy was an Irish missionary in India at the turn of the 20th century. She was instrumental in rescuing young girls from becoming temple prostitutes. Her Dohnavur Fellowship Mission also cared for abandoned babies. Unfortunately, infanticide was still being practiced. The video has commentary from Elisabeth Eliot. They also talk to women who grew up at the mission. Some of whom were taken in as babies and have remained there for many decades to help others.

With a new year beginning (which means the Church Annual meeting will be coming up soon) here is a look back a relevant topic from September 1983. The following was written by our then Pastor, Timothy Bennett (1982-2017).

Commitment

“If I may be permitted to quote myself (and I may -this is my space), “the paradox of faith and works is solved as soon as we consider that faith commits a person to do something namely to receive and follow Jesus Christ.

Our hearts know this well, and the vows entailed in baptism, church membership, and the church covenant reflect our Christian instincts. But other instincts enter into the whole picture of our selves. For every heart-compulsion to respond to the Word of God by a concrete expression of obedience, there is a powerful urge of the opposite sort, fashioning an array of convincing excuses for avoiding any substantial commitment.

Let this be a matter of self-evaluation for all members of this church: we have publicly signified our newness in Christ and thus our oneness with his Body, the Church; we have voluntarily promised our attendance, service and giving to this church; we have bound ourselves to fulfilling Christian duties in our families and in our vocations

Our Lord taught us to let our “yes” be “yes” and our “no” be “no. As to commitment to the church there should need to be no more than the gentle reminder of our own promises (made under no compulsion except that of the Spirit in us) in order to stir us to rededication.

Now would be a good time to renew our vows to reinstate to a place of priority our Christian instincts. With a new and very active season of church life upon us won't you consider that the integrity of your confession of Christ is dependent upon your service to him and his church?”

Rev. Bennett
