BREAKING NEWS FROM MOSES AGAPITO

Moses reported on the situation in S. Sudan which has been getting much worse of late. Many people are being displaced from the country by war and famine and are having to go to refugee camps, one of which is in Uganda. He said his wife and children are OK, but that they miss him. He had hoped to be back there before Christmas, but couldn't afford the money for the flight.

He's been working off and on, but work has been sporadic and difficult. Of late, he's been working an IIPM-4AM shift outdoors, and we all know what the weather has been like. With the number of hours, he's been able to work, he's had trouble saving money to send the clothing and bandaging materials to the Uganda Refugee camp in the north of that country. Moses filled 3 barrels with what we had donated to him from our clothing room about a year and a half ago. He has the funds for 1 barrel, a man of his acquaintance has pledged funds for a second one, but he asked if we at Main Street could fund another. Each barrel costs \$270 to be shipped from either Albany or Syracuse to Malawi, and then to Kampala, Uganda. Missions does not have the money in our budget at present to help him. Therefore, we thought we'd ask if there is a person or a couple who would like to underwrite sending one barrel - \$270. If you are interested in helping, please see Diane Runion soon for details.
